Most of the time the children are playing outside or in our Jurte (Mongolian tent). We are also walking a lot through the woods, and I help to take care of them, so no one gets lost or hurt. And mostly, I play with the children.

The most difficult thing for me is the language, because I speak English and Japanese and the children speak German, so we communicate through body language or we ask the teachers to translate.

What I can learn here is feelings. Back in Japan I was working so hard and had a lot of stress, so I decided that I wanted to be more free. And being here with the children and being in nature gives me the opportunity just to play and be happy.
