ANNEX 1: APPRENTICENSHIP

An "apprenticeship" in *the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg* corresponds to a system of "alternance" training, comparable with the German "Dual System" or the apprenticeships organized by *the Training Institute of Belgian Small Businesses*. This is the traditional vocational training path in our country. The legal framework of an "apprenticeship" in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg.

Apprenticeships have enjoyed a long tradition in the Grand Duchy. Given that the vocational section of the intermediate level is characterized by an apprenticeship in a trade or occupation, acceptance as an apprentice depends on the successful completion of the final year of the lower level (9th class of technical secondary). This three year course is for young people aged between 12 and 15 years. The course content of the lower level is essentially general. The subjects taught during the three years at lower level, particularly languages and mathematics, represent the main selection criteria and pupils cannot move into the intermediate level unless they are competent in these areas. In order to position apprenticeships within this system, it is important to note that technical secondary education consists of 3 levels defined as: 1.) a lower level lasting three years which begins at the end of the 6th year of primary school, 2.) an intermediate level which normally lasts 3 years and consists of a full-time period of theoretical and technical training and a part-time period of vocational training which is directly linked to the apprenticeship served in the company and 3.) an advanced level lasting two years which includes technical training, technician training and provides in-depth vocational training and prepares the ground for higher technical education.

Traditionally, the system of parallel training, i.e. the apprenticeship, has been the most popular for acquiring a certified qualification. However, this path has lost some of its attraction. 570 apprenticeship contracts were registered for the school year 1995/1996 compared with an average of 840 new contracts during the period 1975–1985.
