# 5 Legal basis/legislation for voluntary activities in general and for young people in particular

### 5.1 Legal status of volunteers

There is no legislation for volunteering in Slovenia. Proposal of the Law of voluntarism is prepared and waiting for the proceeding in the Parliament. Consequentially, there is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called #obligatory health insurance#).

#### 5.2 Taxation/tax exemptions for volunteers and volunteer organisations

200.000,00 SIT (apr. 830 EUR) pro year is allowed to be paid without tax for the volunteers. There is no exemption for volunteers.

#### 5.3 Existence of social protection of volunteers

There is no special social protection for volunteers on the national base. There is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called #obligatory health insurance#). Performance of voluntary activities or voluntary service does not give volunteers the rights arising from pension and disability insurance (as is the case of the employed), unemployment insurance, parent care insurance, work accident insurance and professional disease insurance.

# 5.4 Legal situation of unemployed young people participating in voluntary activities

The legal status of volunteers as a general legal status is not regulated. Consequentially, there is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called #obligatory health insurance#).

# 7.1 Relationship between military service, civilian service, civic service and voluntary service

Slovene military service existed till the year 2003 and also included the posibilities for civilian services as obligatory voluntary work. With professionalisation of the military the current arrangement allowing for alternative (civilian) services to the mandatory military service has stopped being an option. Since then the army has become proffesional and no more voluneers are sent to civic services in this way. The new manner of fulfilling membership of the armed forces foresees the possibility of voluntary training and subsequent incorporation of these members into the army reserve forces, yet against pecuniary compensation. There is no voluntary civic service.
