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NARRATIVE AND QUALITATIVE ASSESMENT OF THE REPORT

Short description

- This report of 48 pages is well structured;
- It is the elaboration and processing of surveys between October 2015 and April 2016;
- It wants to contribute to the quality development of E+/YiA;
- It gives answers to questions about the effects of E+/YiA on (p.8..);
 - Projects, project participants and project leaders;
 - The level of access for young people (with special attention of young people with fewer opportunities), organisations, bodies and groups in the youth field;
 - The profile of participants;
 - The development and management of funded projects.

On the methodology

- Basis: online multilingual (25 languages) online survey between October 2015 April 2016;
- Survey implemented on an online survey platform;
- Target groups: actors involved in project funded E+/YiA surveyed after their project ;
- "covering a representative sample of a full year"
- No more details on response, weighting on participants etc. (probably a prior report).

On the results

- Structured on 7 packets:
 - Effects on competence development;
 - Effects on participation and active citizenship
 - Effects on the learning of organisations and communities;
 - Effects on inclusion of young people with fewer opportunities or with special needs;
 - Youth in action trajectories:
 - Implementation of E+/YiA.
- All effects are described in relationship to the development of knowledge, skills, youth work competences, personal development,
- Effects on competence development:
 - In general: the effects on competences: very high for participants and leaders;
 - The project leaders are slightly more positive on the effects on competences and learning;
 - Projects with a variation of age groups and more activity-directed seem more positive.
- Effects on participation and active citizenship:
 - High positive response: Erasmus+YiA really improve participation and active citizenship;
 - This positive response is even higher for youth workers/leaders;
 - Organisations became more open to participation and more positive towards European issues.
- Effects on learning organisations and communities
 - Clearly positive effects, but less strong than the effects on individual level;
 - Special positive effect on intercultural aspects.
- Effects on the inclusion of young people with fewer opportunities/special needs:
 - 61% of project leaders reported involvement of this target group, but with remarks: between 41% in Bulgaria up to 83% in the UK and 91% in Ireland;
 - From the perspective of young people (participants): access to work/employment (39%) and active societal participation (24%), mobility (22%) are the most important obstacles;
 - The project leaders gave other obstacles: poverty (56%), social background (41%), member of disadvantaged group (36%), living in a remote area (31%), caught in a vicious circle of unemployment (30%);

- 83% of the project leaders evaluated their project supported inclusion (42% strongly, 41% agree);
- Globally, E+/YiA contributed to inclusion... an amelioration thanks to the projects.
- A thick description of the respondent profiles, with special attention for:
 - 60% of the participants and 80% of the project leaders have a further education (tertiary degree). This is remarkable higher than de EU-average (40%);
 - On the ethnic, cultural, religious or linguistic minority of the respondents: participants 13% and 17% of the project leaders;
 - Numbers on the experiences of the participants in previous similar projects;
 - 75% of the responding project leaders were in some form of employment (and more details);
 - 63% of the project leaders are involved in these projects as volunteers.
- About the involvement and procedures:
 - The majority through youth organisation/groups/centres, followed by friends. For the participants also schools/colleges are important; for youth leaders the National Agencies;
 - The project leaders are *largely satisfied* on the procedures... but some critics on difficulties with (1) of the online tools, (2) the reports, (3) application and (4) the overall bureaucracy;
 - Unanimous reactions on the 11 covered aspects (differences between types of actions);
 - More positive reactions on longer (15 or more days) projects;
 - A relative but more positive evaluation of the Youthpass more integration seems needed

GLOBAL EVALUATION

- A well-structured report (although a strange mix of effects and different aspects of the participants);
- On a highly relevant topic: the effects of important international youth programmes;
- The narratives are excellent, the conclusions clear and reliable;
- This report gives an overall very positive evaluation of the E+/YiA projects, for participants and project leaders;
- There is no global comprehensive evaluation no advices to improve no summary of the most promising and the critical aspects. Only some critical remarks are mentioned.

This report and these kind of (good) evaluations will gain strength and relevance in a more longitudinal approach, with more critical and policy-improvement conclusions.
