5 Legal basis/legislation for voluntary activities in general and for young people in particular

5.1 Legal status of volunteers

There is no legislation for volunteering in Slovenia. Proposal of the Law of voluntarism is prepared and waiting for the proceeding in the Parliament. Consequentially, there is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called #obligatory health insurance#).

5.2 Taxation/tax exemptions for volunteers and volunteer organisations

200.000,00 SIT (apr. 830 EUR) pro year is allowed to be paid without tax for the volunteers. That is the only exemption for the volunteer organisations. There is no exemption for volunteers. Tax legislation foresees the following situations which may also be applied to performance of voluntary work: - income tax concessions for legal entities in case of donations to non-profit humanitarian and related organizations (not necessarily linked to voluntary work), - the right to reimbursement of work-related expenses to a limited amount (travel expenses, per diem, refunds of accommodation expenses on presentation of due receipts) for persons performing work for a legal entity, though not employed by it). There are no specific laws that would regulate non-profit non-governmental organizations; their tax obligations are determined in the same way as those of other legal entities.



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5.3 Existence of social protection of volunteers

There is no special social protection for volunteers on the national base. There is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called #obligatory health insurance#). Performance of voluntary activities or voluntary service does not give volunteers the rights arising from pension and disability insurance (as is the case of the employed), unemployment insurance, parent care insurance, work accident insurance and professional disease insurance.

5.4 Legal situation of unemployed young people participating in voluntary activities

The legal status of volunteers as a general legal status is not regulated. Consequentially, there is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called #obligatory health insurance#).

7.1 Relationship between military service, civilian service, civic service and voluntary service

Slovene military service existed till the year 2003 and also included the posibilities for civilian services as obligatory voluntary work. With professionalisation of the military the current arrangement allowing for alternative (civilian) services to the mandatory military service has stopped being an option. Since then the army has become proffesional and no more voluneers are sent to civic services in this way. The new manner of fulfilling membership of the armed forces foresees the possibility of voluntary training and subsequent incorporation of these members into the army reserve forces, yet against pecuniary compensation. There is no voluntary civic service.

9 Removing obstacles to young people#s voluntary engagement

9.1 The facilitation of young people#s voluntary engagement

In the middle school - Gimnasium, there is social voluntary work included as a subject on a student's choice. Some propaganda for the university students has been done in previous years. National festival of young volunteers lasts one week in the april each year and is very well represented in the media. Good practices with the exchange of volunteers in the EVS spread among NGOs and young individuals.

9.2 Recent (this year) measures to remove obstacles to young people#s volunteering

The preparation of the law on voluntarism. The discussions in which the actors in the field of voluntary work and voluntary service are currently engaged are mainly directed towards achieving



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a general recognition of the volunteer's status and establishment of an obligatory practice applicable to all volunteers (e.g. issuing of certificates of participation in voluntary work).

9.3 Existing obstacles

Major obstacles 1) to the development and efficiency of the voluntary service: - undefined and legally unrecognized status of the volunteer - problems with residence permits - taxation restrictions - majority of NGOs are based totally on volunteers, therefore the continuity of their programmes is in question. 2) to volunteer participation: - lack of awareness of the importance of voluntary activities or voluntary service in fulfilment of one's own goals (voluntary work is not involved in the curriculum of all middle schools, therefore not all the students have the opportunity for the experiential learning) - lack of tradition in long-term involvement in voluntary work - The volunteers have no social security. Any volunteer's pocket money is taxed as payment.

11.1 Initiatives for recognition 'good practices'

Examples of formal recognition of voluntary activities: - voluntary activities as optional school subjects - national programmes designed to incorporate voluntary work as part of the activities The most socially recognised are the activities and organizations in the field of rescue and protection service (the Fire Brigade Association of Slovenia), their reputation being especially high in smaller communities and rural areas.
