- There is no tax exemption for volunteers.
- Performance of voluntary activities or voluntary service does not give volunteers the rights arising from pension and disability insurance (as is the case of the employed), unemployment insurance, parent care insurance, work accident insurance and professional disease insurance.

There is no legislation for volunteering in Slovenia. Consequentially, there is no social or health protection for volunteers that such a status could provide. However, all people legally resident (permanently or temporarily) in Slovenia (family members, students, unemployed, employed and retired persons) enjoy health insurance (at least the basic rights covered by the so-called obligatory health insurance).

The greatest events promoting voluntary work in Slovenia are congresses on voluntary work, organized by the Slovene Philanthropy. The National Youth Council of Slovenia promotes voluntary work through the action Volunteer of the Year.

Most active in the promotion of voluntary work has been the the Youth National Agency with its various support activities, organized by to enhance the European Voluntary Service

# 10.Explain how (by which means) voluntary activities of young people are recognised in your country. Name certificates and other measures used for that purpose.

Examples of formal recognition of voluntary activities:

- voluntary activities as optional school subjects
- national programmes designed to incorporate voluntary work as part of the activities
- The most socially recognised are the activities and organizations in the field of rescue and protection service (the Fire Brigade Association of Slovenia), their reputation being especially high in smaller communities and rural areas.

Slovenia has also developed system for validation and recognition of non-formal and informal learning, so called National Qualifications System under responsibility of Ministry of Labour, Family and Social Affairs. It is possible to validate experiences gained through voluntary work within this system, but only for persons who are over 18 years old.
