
Youth participation The European Experience





Changes in society

- The loss of truth via the decline of meta-stories: communism, capitalism, religions have lost their influence and power of interpretation of life
- Multi-optional development: eg. not everything technical possible, should be done – struggle about directions
- Individualisation: freedom to choose
- Globalisation and intercultural exchange: perception of trans-cultural differences in everyday life.
- Networking: contacts beyond traditional structures
- **Economic crisis:** Different answers to the same question?




Participation in Europe






The right to participate for youth


Impact on participation

- Participation is welcomed by the governments as long as it respects the rules (of the governments)
- The role of youth is important in future developments so we have to know what young people want and therefore they are invited to get their voices heard.
- Youth councils, youth NGOs, structured dialogue (on- and offline), research – all to get the young people involved in decision making, but...



i-participation: engagement if it is important for me

- Traditional forms of participation are not the only ways to get heard – new forms became popular.
- A-traditional forms of protest like a boycott, wearing Tshirts, posting on social media pages.
- "old school" membership in parties or organisations decrease in Europe.
 Decrease in solidarity?
- The closer the topic is to my heart the more I get involved.
