Mr Roko Andričević Assistant Minister Ministry of Science, Education and Sports Croatia

Mr Roko Andričević is the Deputy Minister of Science, Education and Sports of Croatia. He has served in various leadership positions at higher education institutions and governmental offices and has extensive experience in team management and project leadership. His fields of expertise are in science, innovation and technology, with particular emphasis on water resources engineering.

He earned a PhD degree on water resources and environmental visiting scientist at the Stanford University California. He worked as

science from the, and was a PhD visiting scientist at the Stanford University, California. He worked as research professor and associate in US, until 2002 when he joined the Ministry for Environmental Protection and Physical Planning as Assistant Minister. Mr. Andričević has been responsible for developing legislation, strategic documents and implementation programmes for approximation activities of the European Union and has been member of important governmental bodies and committees.

Ms Mirella Rašić

Team leader for Political Reporting and Analysis European Commission Representation in Croatia

Ms Mirella Rašić has been working for the European Commission since 1993. She was project assistant and coordinator for the European Community Humanitarian Office in Zagreb during the EC humanitarian assistance in former Yugoslavia. Two years later she became Political and Economic Advisor to the European Commission Office as well as the Office of the Special Envoy of the European Commission. As of 1998-2009 she worked as media and communication advisor to the Delegation of the European Union.

She has been involved in the process of the institutionalisation of

the relationship between Croatia and the EU through Stabilisation and Association Process as well as in the pre-accession process from 2005 until the end of accession negotiations and finally Croatia's accession to the EU on 1 July 2013.

When the Lisbon Treaty entered into force she switched to the European External Action Service as Media and Communications Advisor within the EU Delegation in Zagreb. She acted as a spokesperson of the EU Delegation and project manager for a number of communication and media related activities designed and implemented during Croatia's accession process and ahead of the EU referendum in 2012. As of 1 July 2013 she is working as a Head of Political Section and Analysis as well as acting European Semester Officer.





Mr Jean-Christophe Bas Director of Democratic Citizenship and Participation Council of Europe

Mr Jean-Christophe Bas took over the position of Director of Democratic Citizenship and Participation at the Council of Europe in June 2014. The directorate is composed of a team of approximately 160 staff working in the fields of Education and Youth to foster democratic competences, participation and responsible citizenship.

Prior to this he collaborated from 2008 to 2014 with the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations in New York as Deputy Director in charge of Strategic Developments and Partnerships.

From 1999 to 2008, Jean-Christophe served as the Head of

Development Policy Dialogue at the World Bank and set up innovative mechanisms of strategic policy engagement on Development and Poverty eradication with key decision makers around the World.

Ms Sarah Keating Head of Unit Unit for Regional & Bilateral Co-operation - South East Europe and Turkey Council of Europe

Ms Sarah Keating joined the Council of Europe's Education Department in 1994, and is currently Head of Unit responsible for bilateral and regional cooperation in South East Europe and Turkey. Ms Judith Hollenweger Zurich University of Teacher Education Zurich

Ms Judith Hollenweger, Professor, PhD. is the head of the priority area "Inclusive Education" at the Zurich University of Teacher Education. In this capacity she spearheads the University's efforts to integrate knowledge and improve knowledge creation processes to bridge the gap between research, policy and practice. She works as a consultant and expert for UNICEF's regional office for Central and Eastern Europe, Commonwealth of Independent States Regional Office (CEE/CIS) in Geneva to assist member countries in implementing

She is a member of the steering committee of the ICF Research Branch (affiliated to the German Collaborating Center for the World Health Organization's Family of International Classifications, WHO-FIC).



Mr Julian Stanley Vocational Education and Training Specialist European Training Foundation Turin, Italy

Mr Julian Stanley spent the first half of his career working as a VET teacher and manager in a variety of schools in the London area. Mr Aleksa Bjeliš was employed at the Institute of Physics from 1971 to 1988, and in 1988 he joined the Department of Physics at the Faculty of Science, University of Zagreb. From 1990 to 1997 he was Vice-dean and from 2000 to 2002 Dean of the Faculty of Science, University of Zagreb. From 2002 to 2006 he served as vice-rector for research and development, and from 2006 until 2014 as the rector, at the University of Zagreb.

From 2002 on he has been continuously the member, firstly of the Steering Committee for Higher Education and Research (CDESR), and then of the Steering Committee for Educational

Policy and Practice (CDPPE) of the Council of Europe. Presently he is the member of the Bureau of the Committee. From 2006 he has also been the member of the Council of Magna Charta Observatory.

His research activity is of a theoretical character, and covers different problems in the condensed matter physics, mostly in physics of dimensionally reduced systems. He has produced some 70 scientific publications, published mostly in international open journals. He was visiting professor and/or scientist at about twenty universities and scientific institutes in France, the USA, Canada, Italy, Switzerland, Slovenia and Hungary. He is a member of the European Physical Society and the Croatian Physical Society
